If last year the Pentwater Lightning Fleet had "arrived." this year it can be said to have flourished.

Expressions of shock and disbelief from the traditional winners were frequent as they repeatedly observed boats they had previously considered antiques or pleasure craft, tailing them closely (or leading them) around the final marks. Increased activities were also in order this year. Match races were introduced to give each skipper the opportunity to wreak vengeance on his traditional rival, and they were more than successful. A Junior Lightning Race provided the younger sailors with a chance to put the seniors out to pasture, something they very nearly accomplished. Sue Roth and Mark Gwillim won it this year, sailing INDEFATIGABLE. The addition of seven slips surrounding the club and the wide use of spinnakers (even our newest entry, Don Lambrix, had his out every weekend) also considerably enhanced interest within and about the fleet.

Needless to say, our list of trophy winners was extensive. The well known sailing firm of Cartland, Mira, Jones & Ritter (alias Cartland & Co.) always provides strong competition. This year was no exception, as Jack and John Jones captured the Hewitt Series in July. Jeff Gobble (minus two wallets and three pairs of glasses) took the August Series, using in the process more different crew members than he cares to remember. Strong challenges were presented in both series by McMullen, Hallenbeck, and Bats/McKevitt.

Our Season Series went right down to the wire, and was to be settled by FRANTIC and INDEFATIGABLE on the final Sunday in August. Much to the bewilderment of both, Walt Hallenbeck, with the assistance of wife and jib specialist Bernice and spinnaker man Alan Graettinger, left them a half mile behind as he tasted the roses for the first time and took a third for the season.
